
German Forest walk at Hughenden

This 1.5-mile walk explores the dark evergreen woods inspired by Benjamin and Mary Anne Disraeli's visits to the Northern Bohemian forests on the German/Czech border. The walk includes a mix of woodlands and gently rolling valleys with views across a mixture of grazed and ploughed fields divided by hedgerows.

Activity: Walking

Easy: Most of the walk is on soft and surfaced footpaths. For further details, please see Terrain section.

Dog friendly: Dogs are welcome to be off lead around the woodland but please return them to a lead when walking close to cattle and sheep. Please do not allow your dog to frighten other people or chase wildlife.

Full trail: Miles: 1.5 (km: 2.4)

Duration: 1 hour

Terrain

Most of the walk is on soft and surfaced footpaths. There is one short, steep slope. There are no stiles. Dogs are welcome. Some paths can be muddy and slippery after prolonged or heavy rain. Stout walking shoes or walking boots are recommended in wet conditions or after heavy rain. The walk is easy to

Total steps: 9

Start point: Hughenden visitor welcome kiosk. Grid ref: SU860955.

- 1. From the visitor welcome kiosk, retrace your steps towards the main car park. At the Tjunction of paths by the Dew Pond, turn left. There is a purple waymarker on a post. After about 25m turn right along a more or less level path at another purple waymarker.
- 2. The National Trust Rangers at Hughenden have recently been clearing diseased ash trees on this path. The gaps this has created allow views across Echo Valley towards Manor Farm and the D'Israeli Monument. Continue on relatively the level path through the German Forest for another 500 metres until you reach a crossing of five paths.
- 3. At the junction of paths, take the first path on the left that heads downhill. (This path can be very rutted in places as it is used by vehicles for forestry work.) Ignoring any crossing paths and bearing left at a fork after 50m, follow this path until it reaches the base of the slope and meets a bridleway running along the bottom of the valley.
- 4. Turn left on to the bridleway and follow it along the bottom of the valley towards a field gate 100m away.
- 5. Turn left off the bridleway just before the field gate, following the footpath uphill between the trees. At the T-junction, turn right along an open path which skirts the lower edge of Hanging Wood. On your right you can get a good view of the D'Israeli Monument and of Echo Valley towards High Wycombe. In spring and summer look out for the colourful wildflower banks on both sides of the path.
- 6. Continue straight ahead along the path into an area of woodland, keeping to the main path.

follow, waymarked with purple marker arrows at all main changes of direction.

- 7. On reaching a wooden signpost, follow the route ahead and uphill towards Hughenden Manor and tea-room.
- 8. On reaching the top of a short, steep slope, follow the narrow sunken road ahead of you between flint walls. Please take care as vehicles use this road. You will soon reach a junction of roads and paths with the gates to Hughenden Manor and its gardens on your right, and the stableyard and walled garden on your left.
- 9. When you are ready to continue, take the road that curves uphill to the left of the stableyard, with the apple orchard picnic area on your left, to reach the visitor welcome kiosk.

End point: Hughenden visitor welcome kiosk. Grid ref: SU860955.
